Stormwater Pollution Prevention Tips

Stormwater Runoff

•Stormwater Runoff occurs when precipitation from rain flows over the ground.

•Impermeable surfaces (such as driveways, sidewalks, and streets) prevent stormwater runoff from naturally soaking into the ground. •Stormwater can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt and other pollutants. •Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the water we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water.

•Polluted runoff is the nation's greatest threat to clean water.



Stormwater Pollution

Easy ways to protect our water:

- Have your septic tank pumped and system inspected regularly.
- Wash your car at a car wash.
- Check your car for leaks and recycle your motor
- oil. Leaves don't belong in the storm drain
- Clean up after your pet.
- Don't Litter.
- Use the least toxic pesticides, follow labels and learn how to prevent pest problems.
- Compost your yard waste.
- Never dump anything down storm drains or in streams.

Lawn Care

- Don't overwater your lawn.
- Compost or mulch yard waste. Don't leave it in the street or sweep it into storm drains or streams.
- Cover piles of dirt or mulch being used in landscaping projects.
- You can collect rainwater from rooftops in mosquito-proof containers. The water can be used later on lawn or garden areas.
 Vegetated Filter Strips- filter strips are areas of native grass or plants
- created along roadways or streams. They trap the pollutants stormwater picks as it flows across driveways and streets.

Pet Waste

• Pet waste can be a major source of bacteria in local waters.

• When walking your pet, remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks.
